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Description: This course is divided into three parts:

- **Part I** offers an intensive introduction to the most important monographic and journal literature on the Golden Horde.
- **Part II** introduces the most important literature dealing with the legacy of the Golden Horde in the formation and rise of the Tatar, Kazakh, and Uzbek nations. Additional assigned readings will stress innovative methodological approaches to the social and economic history of Western Eurasia and Central Asia during both periods.
- **Part III** introduces the period of Russian colonization of Central Asia. It emphasizes identity formation, post-colonial studies, and other new approaches to the study of Central Asian history in the Imperial period.

Requirements: Students will be expected to read important scholarly literature (in one or more research language, where applicable). In addition to a group of shared core readings, students will be assigned monographic and journal literature for reading and discussion. Each student will contribute at least three assignments. The first paper will be a comparative study of sources for the Mongol World Empire in the 13th or 14th centuries (including the translations of Boyle, Dawson, and others) of approximately 8-10 pages. The remaining two papers are usually written versions of oral presentations, each about 8-10 pages in length. Each assignment will be presented first in draft form prior to or immediately after the oral presentation; it will then be revised and rewritten in final form. **Graduate students may submit a longer research paper instead of separate papers for #2-#3 by agreement with the instructor.**

Readings: The “Required Common Readings” (see attached **Bibliography**) will form a shared set of readings. Students are strongly encouraged to read the “Suggested Readings” as well. There will be an additional set of readings assigned from the packet (or related to research projects) to individual students or groups of students for weekly discussion and/or written assignments.
